Heavy rain: 1 killed

Bangalore,(UNI)- A 65year-old man died on the spot when a house wall collapsed at Chikkanayakana halli in Tumakur District of Karnataka due to heavy rain since last night.

Police said Chikkabasavaiah was asleep when the wall collapsed on him.

More than ten houses have collapsed due to incessant rain and authorities have taken steps to shift the affected people to safer places.

BJP Chief Whip resigns

Bangalore, (UNI)- Chief Whip of Ruling BJP, Mr Jeevraj, today tendered his resignation with an eye on Ministership during the proposed expansion of the Karnataka Cabinet.

Talking to newsmen here, he said "I have been working as Chief Whip for the last four years... that is during JD(S) coalition with BJP and after BJP came to power.

"This is sufficient for me, I dont want to continue in the post and have given resignation letter to the Chief Minister"." Replying to a question, he said "as any other aspirant, I have also asked for Minister post which is prerogative of the Chief Minister.

"But, if I do not get it, I will remain as MLA and will not again asume Chief Whip post." Mr Jeevraj, a two-time Legislator, represents the temple

Yeddyurappa likely to expand Ministry

Bangalore, (UNI)-Karnataka Chief Minister B S Yeddyurappa, who had won the legal battle in the Karnataka High Court on the issue of disqualification of 11 rebel BJP Legislators from the Assembly, is likely to expand his Ministry on Wednesday.

According to sources, the Chief Minister had decided to expand his Ministry by inducting four new faces, including Lone Independent MLA Varthur Prakash, who had extended his support to the government during October 14 Floor Test.

A decision to include Mr Prakash into the Ministry was expected to be taken at the Core-Committee meeting of the State BJP, which is likely to meet this evening.

University College may be a National Heritage structure

Mangalore, (UNI)- The Union Government is considering the idea of preserving the ancient structures of University College in Mangalore here as national heritage structure.

The Union Ministry of Culture has directed the National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage (INTACH) to prepare a report on the conservation requirements of the college's heritage structures.

Mr M Veerappa Moily, the Union Minister for Law, who is also the Honorary President of Mangalore University College Alumni Association, convened a meeting to discuss the development work that the college required, yesterday.

He said the government would take the initiative of handing over the responsibility of conserving and restoring the heritage buildings of the college to INTACH and that an INTACH team would visit the college s soon as possible.

In response to the Union Ministry's request, INTACH Director (programme) Divay Gupta wrote a letter to University College Mangalore informing them that due to its expertise, it had been requested to prepare an initial



report on the conservation requirements of the college's heritage structure and that INTACH had decided to visit the college at the end of November.

INTACH has also requested the authorities of the college to prepare a project proposal, an INTACH release said here today.

Harley-Davidson to assemble motorcycles in India

New Delhi, (UNI)- will continue to be imported Harley-Davidson India today announced that it will assemble select models of motorcycles in the country at its CKD (complete knock-down) assembly facility which is set to be operational in the first half of 2011 in the state of Haryana.

The company would commence assembling of the motorcycles from component kits supplied by its parent company's plants located in Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and Missouri and by the its suppliers in the US, it said in a state-

as completely built motorcycles for now, it added.

"We are building a strong foundation for our business in India, first by establishing a world-class dealer network, and now by commencing CKD assembly operations," said Harley-Davidson India Managing Director Anoop Prakash.

Till now, Harley-Davidson India has been importing completely assembled motorcycles from the company's US final assembly plants.

"This investment will allow Harley-Davidson to However, other models improve our market responsiveness and production flexibility while reducing the tariff burden, which we expect will drive growth over time by making our bikes more accessible to India's consumers, "said Harley-Davidson Motor Company President and Chief Operating Officer Matthew S Levatich.

India will be the second country in which Harley-Davidson will have CKD assembly operations outside the US, after Brazil where the company began assembly operations in 1999.

Harley-Davidson India commenced operations in August 2009 and opened its first dealership in July 2010.

The company currently offers 12 models in its 2010 lineup in India, available through authorised dealerships in New Delhi, Mumbai, Chandigarh and Hyderabad.

Plastic ban to be strict: **Minister**

Mangalore, (UNI)-Karnataka Port, Endowment and Environment Minister Krishna J Palemar, today said his Ministry has already issued circular banning the use of plastic around Hindu temples and other religious places and the measure will be strictly implemented within a week.

Addressing the media on the sidelines of Kannada Rajyotsava Celebration at Nehru Maidan here, Mr Palemar who is also Dixina Kannada Disrict Incharge warned those who violated the order would invite tough The circular ispenalties. sued last week entailed a fine of Rs 1 lakh or a sentence of seven years for those who violate the order as stipulated by the Environment Protection Act, he cautioned. Siamese twins separated in rare surgery

Thanjavur, (UNI)- In a rare surgery, a team of doctors at Rajah Mirasdar Government Hospital, attached to Thanjavur Medical College here, sucessfully separated four-yearold parasitic conjoined male twins or Siamese twins as they are usually called, yesterday.

According to Dr T V Sathappan, Head of the Department of Paediatric Surgery, Thanjavur Medical College, the operation process lasted for three hours. After separation, the



larger twin was kicking and alive. He was normal, he said.

Dr Sathappan,

who led the surgery process, said there were several types of conjoined twins and this case was one of parasitic twins. These were twins that were conjoined resulting in one of them being smaller and less formed and thus dependent on the larger for survival. The conjoined twins were delivered by a caesarean section at a private hospital at Kumbakonam, he added.

"This is one of the rarest of rare anomalies that occur once in ten lakh births," Dr Sathappan said.

Paediatrics Surgery Department functioning at Rajah Mirasdar Government Hospital is fully equipped to handle such complicated surgeries.
