# Editorial

# Unresolved Bilateral Issues

India and Bangladesh share historical, geographical and cultural bonds not only with a common history of struggle for freedom and liberation but also enduring feelings of both fraternal as well as familial ties. Bangladesh has 'Bengali' a lingual and cultural attachment with West Bengal, a province of India. Besides, its three-fourth of the border is surrounded by India. Although being so 'neighbour', India-Bangladesh relationship has not developed so far, as it was supposed to be. Instantly, there are some ongoing bilateral issues unresolved on the table need to be solved soon. After the Modi Govt. came in power, Sushma Swaraj's first stand-alone visit as the External Affairs Minister was to Dhaka in June where she primarily sought to remove the trust deficit between the two populous neighbours. It sounds good that government is keen to solve these problems and hopeful to bring the Constitutional amendment bill for land border agreement (LBA) in the budget session of Parliament beginning in the last week of March.

During Congress period, an agreement over Teesta river-water sharing, was reached at the last moment, Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee disapproved the deal. The federal structure and coalition politics of India had made decision making a complex and tough enterprise, especially when one take into account the political obligations of accommodating the demands of the regional stake-holders. The issue appeared to be lost in political backbiting between New Delhi and Kolkata. On the other side, Bangladesh also adopted a practical approach in dealing with India. In the event of not signing the Teesta water-sharing treaty, the government has called off the exchange of transit-related documents. Prime Minister of Bangladesh, Sheikh Hasina has stressed the need for India to seal the Teesta Water-Sharing Treaty at the earliest possible. Dhaka is also expecting New Delhi to ratify the Land Boundary Agreement that would allow the two countries to exchange land enclaves.

Killing of Bangladeshi citizens in the India-Bangladesh border has become one of the discomfitures between the two nation's bilateral relations in recent years. The so-called 'Trigger Happy' or 'shoot-to-kill' policy by the India's Border Security Forces (BSF)that according to Human Rights Watch killed nearly 1,000 Bangladeshis between 2001 and 2011 has remained at the core of the talks between Bangladeshi and Indian officials visiting each other.

On the other hand, India is stressing on the Land Border Agreement – exchanging of transit, illegal immigrants of Bangladeshi citizens, terrorist insurgent groups and border crimes issues to be solved soon.

Recently PM Modi has sent a letter to Dhaka, wishing a visit in very next month after the budget session indicating a solution of these problems. Mamata Banarjee on a visit to Dhaka has also assured Sheikh Hasina about the Teesta watersharing treaty..

The Modi Government is now ardent on merging and propping up ties with India's neighbours is obvious from its decision to improve the quality of relationship with Bangladesh. Let us see how BJP reach to a consensus settling the issues in Parliament and fructify the connection with Dhaka. It will be an achievement for both the countries if they are able to solve these problems politically and bring a meaningful change to this bilateral relationship.



# "Discovery of Childhood"

The little prince



I first read this book when I was 20. The first ever translation i had read which wasn't prescribed in any text book. The little prince by Antoine De Saint-Exupery is originally a french book written for readers above age 6 or so. It must be surprising why i read a children's book at the age of 20. Here's why.

The book, originally published in the year 1943, is one of the most popular books to have been translated into more than 250 languages and selling over 140 million copies every year, which makes it one the best selling novels of all time.

The story revolves around a pilot who has crashed in the Sahara desert where he meets the little prince while trying to repair his wrecked plane. The pilot develops an unlikely friendship with this child who claims to have come from a far away asteroid where he lives with his beloved flower, a rose. The prince who feels that the flower doesnt reciprocate the love decides to travel to different asteroids and planets. On his travel,

On his travel, he meets a king with no one to rule upon,a business man whose life is only numbers, a drunkard, a lamplighter, a geographer and a fox which wants to be tamed. The conversation with the little prince triggers the memory of ones childhood and a desperate urge to rediscover the lost child everyone once had within themselves. The quotes from the book "you are, forever, responsible for what you have tamed ", "anything essential is invisible to the eyes" are remain memorable for a long time. It is one of those rare books that surpasses specific readership and it will make a difference in the lives of all those who would let the little prince tame them. It is a beautiful book everyone must read atleast once.

## **Know your Paintings**

know your paintings: The persistence of memory (1931)

The Persistence of Memory by Salvador Dali depicts a head-like object lying on the ground like a beached whale. It's eyes are closed, suggesting that what's being observed refers to dream state, or at least a process related to imagination and things that are unseen by natural eye. The drooping pocketwatches possibly suggest the irrelevance of time during sleep. In other words, when we are asleep, or not conscious, the time does not persist, only memories do.



This distortion of time can be easily observed by just about anyone who ever attempted to think about the nature of their own dreams. Art historians speculate that the painting may be a visual depiction of the idea behind the Einstein's theory of relativity: that time itself is relative and not fixed. But that's quite possibly a shot in the dark. The painting's meaning strongly suggests psychoanalytical values.

The original title of this painting in Spanish, the native language of the artist, is "La Persistencia De La Memoria" and it depicts a fetus-like head lying on the ground, like a fish that was washed ashore and now decaying after a lost struggle gasping for air. There are four watches in this painting, three of which appear to be molten, as if made out of cheese. The only watch whose structure doesn't appear to be malformed – unlike other watches it is orange in color – is sitting on a desk-like object. The ants seem to have found a point of interest in the center of the orange watch.

Without having seen this painting in person it is not difficult to think that the dimensions of this painting are bigger than what they really are. This minimalist painting is only 9 1/2 by 13" inch (24.1 x 33cm). Perhaps the reason for this illusion is that art enthusiasts often become familiar with this painting in the form of a wall poster the format of which is larger in dimension.

Rendered in Dali's hallmark faint brown, yellow and blue colors this painting has earned him world-wide recognition at age 27.

#### Ran- A Ballad of Treason

Direction: Akira Kurosawa Time: 162 minutes

Ran, 27th movie of Akira Kurosawa, renowned Japanese director is an adaptation of Shakespeare's King Lear. The 1985 movie is among the bests of Kurosawa. The movie shows the ups and downs of the king Hidetora, The great lord. Hidetora and his sons do the role of King Lear and his daughters. The great warrior Hidetora shares the kingdom among his sons. He makes his eldest one, Tora his successor and Jiro with his another castle. And banishes his youngest son Saburo. He wanted his sons to rule the kingdom supporting each other and to carry his legacy forward. Unfortunately, his sons fight each other, attacks Hidetora. He becomes mad and wanders in the plains of the country. He was followed by another banished servant, who follows the order of Saburo to protect the great lord. This resembles much of Shakespeare's King Lear, who loves his other daughters except one, who comes to his service at the end.

Hidetora wins a lot of wars, sheds blood of his and his rivals, burns their castle and at the end madly introspects his actions. Kurosawa picturized the saying pretty clearly, 'what goes around that comes around'..!

Hidetora is always accompanied by a joker who talks nonsense to make him and his fellow men happy. But he starts speaking the truths when the king goes mad and starts talking senselessly. Kurosawa taken care of all the characters in such a way that all the characters have their own weightage. The timely transitions in the characters prove nothing is permanent. In this angle of perception, even Buddha has become a mere spectator for all these violence and extremism of human behavior.

Kurosawa done the movie Ran when he was 75! He struggled to find producers for the movie over a decade. Though he won many awards for his amazing works, received appreciation all over the globe, he wasn't able to find a producer in Japan. All his movies were not succeeded in Japanese box office. After a long time he found a Russian producer for the movie, and done the big budget movie of that time. Talking about the technical aspects of the movie, each frame went by as though it was painted with precision.

This movie dons one of the neatest screenplay. . Everything from the editing, the mise-en-scene, the dialogues were finely crafted. The colours used, the Samurai costumes of the actors, and the heavenly land-scape shots were very distinct and pleasing to the eyes. The movie's costume designer, Emi Wada won an Oscar for the Best costume design.

Kurosawa's love and obsession towards the samurai culture can be easily recognized. The dramatic music was appropriately used wherever necessary. Even the unspoken words in the movie brought out the requisite emotions. Unlike Kurosawa's earlier movies like Rashomon, the actors in this movie haven't dramatized much. The actor's didn't merely play the role, but lived it. The transition in the court jester and the great lord Hidetora's character was remarkable. They were the perfect example to the dialogue 'In a mad world, only mad are sane'. Akira Kurosawa, who is often known as the first to point the camera at the sun, experimented with the cinematography and succeeded in capturing the very essence of the tragedy of King Lear. The addition of landscape shot which symbolized the mood of the following scenes were creative and weren't used before. The gore of the tragic war

between the brothers was shown subtly, comparing with other film of that era. The cinematographers have played with lights and shadows to directly symbolize the story.

The incredible ability of Kurosawa to tell stories can be seen through his editing as well. The abrupt cuts in the first scene of the movie created a curiosity in the audience. His infamous quick editing technique was used exceptionally in the movie. But the movie was not in a quick swift as his editing is. War scenes felt a bit lengthy and draggy. Some of the scenes, war and the old kings running around felt repetitive.

The 16th century king's tragedy is the last big shot of Kurosawa. Ran which he made at the age of 75, shows the affection and dedication of Akira Kurosawa towards film industry which fed him over the decades. This masterpiece of Kurosawa defines its uniqueness in every frame.
