The Centre must should implement its proposals before continuing talks with the farmers

Both sides unrelenting in their contradictory positions, an agreement between the Narendra Modi government and the agitating farmers on the question of three controversial Farm Bills appears elusive. With the farmers' organisations calling for a blockade of Delhi's highways to Jaipur and Agra by December 12, tensions may escalate further. A large number of these farmers from the neighbouring States of the national capital are camping at locations around it for two weeks now After several rounds of talks, the Centre has now offered a written assurance that government procurement at minimum support price would remain, along with proposals to amend the laws to deal with farmers' concerns regarding parity between State-run and private mandis, registration of traders, and dispute resolution mechanisms. These assurances are in response to the concerns being raised by the farmers, but they find them inadequate and half-hearted. They have decided to intensify the strike, demanding complete repeal of the controversial laws. The government has ruled out their repeal, setting the stage for a showdown.

Farmers, howsoever politically empowered they might be in some parts of the country, are at the mercy of market forces and government policy all the time. The Centre appears willing to brazen it out in the face of stiff opposition from the people most affected by the laws. In this battle of unequals, the government should look at a just settlement, not a political compromise The underlying premise of the Centre that farmers will be better off in an open market needs to be qualified. No country serious about food security can leave farming and marketing of produce entirely to market forces. Even the most free market countries and the WTO acknowledge this. India's agriculture marketing and its crop pattern both undoubtedly require reforms. And reforms do trigger resistance. The way forward is not by questioning democracy itself as senior government officials and functionaries of the ruling BJP have been doing. The Centre must be more cognisant of the fact that the farmers and the farm sector are both under its protection, and they cannot be free market actors. Thy do not have enough leverage to protect their own interest in negotiations with big corporations. There is no point in replacing existing distortions in the agriculture sector with reforms that do not inspire confidence among the farmers. As a start, the Centre must go ahead and fulfil all the promises it made to the agitating farmers, rather than use those as a negotiating position. It must legislate the guarantee of MSP and reassure farmers on procurement and subsidies.

The territory of Bandipur

Bandipur National Park one of the most stunning National Parks in India. Situated between the picturesque Western Ghats next to the Mysore-Ooty highway in Karnataka, the Park was once the private hunting reserve for the Maharaja of Mysore. It's now home to elephants, gaurs, tigers, sloth bears, muggers, Indian rock pythons and Dholes. The park was established in 1974 as a tiger reserve under Project Tiger and has a good number of Tigers. Birds like the jungle fowl and green pigeon are also found

Located about 80 km South of Mysore, Bandipur National Park is one of the best tiger reserves in the country and a prominent national park in Karnataka. It is separated from Nagarahole National Park by the Kabini reservoir, but is otherwise contiguous with it, as well as with Mudumalai and Wayanad sanctuaries, together constituting the 6000 sq km Nilgiris Biosphere Reserve. It is basically located at the confluence of three states. At the last count, there were over 75 tigers and more than 3000 elephants in this park, so sightings are fairly common in this area. With the beautiful mist covered Nilgiris in the background, this park is known for its scenic beauty. This National Park was formed by including most of the forest areas of the then Venugopala Wildlife Park. This reserve was brought under Project Tiger in 1973. The Bandipur National Park is located at the confluence of Western and Eastern Ghats, serving as a central link in the seasonal migration of elephants from Mudumalai Sanctuary and Satyamangalam forest division in the east and south east to Nagarahole National Park and Wynad Sanctuary in the west and North West. The Park is a significant component of 5500 sq.km and nilgiri Biosphere Reserve which is one of the largest conservation areas in India. It supports a very high density of elephant population with significant number of adult tuskers.

The park is one of the richest wildlife areas in India, being particularly noted for its intact assemblage of seven large angulate species and three large predatory carnivores and tiger, leopard and dholes. The government provides cottages and dormitories for those who wish to have a memorable Bandipur National Park stay. Bandipur National Park safari timings are from 8:30 AM to 12:15 PM and 4 PM to 7 PM. Stuffed with a wide range of beautiful wildlife and multitudes of teak and sandalwood trees; this is the first Biosphere Reserve of the country as well as the site chosen for the Project Tiger. Situated in Nilgiris, this area is blessed with a unique natural beauty. The entry point and interpretation centre of the park is located in Bandipur village on the highway after Melkamanahalli village. Private vehicles are not allowed inside the park and one has to hire safari jeeps from the jungle safari organisers located around the forest. The best time to be in Bandipur National Park is from June to October.


BOOK REVIEW

Shot Down

For the first time, the full and complete story of the B-17 Flying Fortress Susan Ruth is shared in unbelievable detail. Shot Down was created from the vast number of letters and journals of Howard Snyder; diaries of men and women on the ground who rescued, sheltered and hid the crew; and interviews conducted by historians. Centered around the 306th Bomb Group in Thurleigh, England, it is informative, insightful and captivating.For most, 70 years is a long time ago. World War II fades in importance as each year goes by. Shot Down moves history out of the footnotes into reality, keeping the stories of real people alive as they experience being shot down. You are there, almost holding your breath as Lt. Snyder gets his crew out of his B-17 when bailing out over Nazi occupied Europe.

Steve Snyder's book, Shot Down is about pilot Howard Snyder and his crew of the B-17 Susan Ruth, in particular about the dramatic experiences of each crew member after their plane was knocked out of the sky by German fighters over the French/Belgium border on February 8, 1944. Some men died. Some were captured and became prisoners of war. Some evaded the Germans for awhile but were betrayed, captured, and shot. Some men evaded capture and were missing in action for seven months. The stories are all different and are all remarkable.Through personal letters, oral and written accounts, military records, and interviews – all from people who took part of the events that happened 70 years ago, the stories of the crewmen comes alive. Further enhancing the story are more than 200 time period photographs of the people and places described in the book.

However even before the dramatic battle in the air and the subsequent harrowing events on the ground, the story is informative, insightful, and captivating. Prior to the fateful event, the book outlines the men's training, their journey to England, their life while stationed there, and their combat mis-sions Everything is censions. tered around the 306th Bomb Group stationed at Thurleigh, England of which the crew of the Susan Ruth was a part. To add background and context, many historical facts about



the war are entwined throughout the story so that the reader has a feel for and understanding of what was occurring on a broader scale. Thus, the book is a fascinating story about brave individuals, featuring pilot Howard Snyder, set within the compelling events of the war in Europe.

You will be given an insider's seat to the hopes, dreams and fears of a remarkable group of young airmen and the brave Belgian people that loved, cared and risked their lives for them. In 1989, a memorial to the crew of the Susan Ruth was dedicated at Macquenoise, Belgium and every year celebrations are held to honor and remember the men who are now all gone but not forgotten.

MASTER

There are some redeeming ideas in Master that shows Lokesh Kanagaraj's real talent as a storyteller. Especially, the way he has written his hero and the antagonist.

One of Lokesh Kanagaraj's discernable qualities as a storyteller is the discipline with which he approaches a subject. And that discipline is conspicuous by its absence in Master. Master is neither a nail-biter like Maanagaram nor a pacy thriller like Kaithi.

Lokesh had promised a Vijay film which would be very different from movies that Vijay usually does. Did he deliver on his promise? Yes. Master is the most fun, sensible, enjoyable and good looking movie that Vijay has done in a long time. Did I mention sensible?

After a long gap, Vijay has played, if you will, a nuanced character with qualities that don't comply with the definition of a "complete man". JD, which is short for John Durairaj (Vijay), is an unruly professor at a popular college in Chennai. He is adored by students, and that makes him enemy no 1 of the old guard in the management. He is a professor of psychology, who teaches focus as a subject. A quality that he lacks in his life. His greatest flaw is he has no focus, and he doesn't pay heed to what people tell him. He hears but never listens. He doesn't do what he preaches. Say, he is a hypocrite. He's deeply flawed. And that is



what makes Master stand out from recent Vijay movies.

JD doesn't take himself too seriously. And his first response to any problem is not violence. I don't recall a movie where Vijay played a character that didn't believe no problem was too complex that couldn't be solved with the fist. When a cop at the juvenile prison gives JD an opportunity to take out his anger on unruly inmates who have caused him irreplaceable loss, he refuses. And questions the role of the cops, the system, and the society in turning young people into hardened criminals. In any other Vijay movie, his character would have first thrashed those boys before giving them a moral lesson. Another quality of JD is that he doesn't waste time debating right and wrong with people he intends to hurt. That is so un-Vijay.

So, yes, Lokesh has given us a different Vijay movie as he promised.Lokesh Kanagaraj, who has co-written the film with

DRAMA REVIEW

King Lear

It's often said that there's no greater grief than a parent's loss of a child, so it follows that there's no more devastating moment in King Lear than when the monarch's pitiless odyssey through familial betrayal, rage and madness, triggered by his own blind vanity, leaves him cradling the dead body of the one daughter whose love for him was pure. That goes double when the title character's tragic arc is explored, in Sam Gold's aggressively modern, gender-blind production, by the magnificent Glenda Jackson. The searing pathos of Lear's abject diminishment seems all the more powerful given the steely authority that precedes

Having the versatile Wilson double as Cordelia and the Fool turns out to be one of the more inspired touches, and not just for the jaunty Chaplinesque physicality and Cockney cheekiness she brings to the latter. Shakespeare was infinitely kinder here about fathers and sons than fathers



and daughters, but with the Fool wearing the same face as the banished Cordelia, the doting paternalistic affection Lear shows for the jester becomes quite affecting. The Fool's sardonic mockery is not unlike Cordelia's outspokenness, but while the king is amused by one, he brays with indignation at the other.

In the opening scene at court, when Lear declares that he will divide up his kingdom among his daughters, apportioning the land according to the depths of love and devotion they profess, Wilson makes Cordelia almost smug. She appears removed from it all, refusing to pander to the old man's egomaniacal demands or to hide her disdain for her sisters' fawning insincerity. She's not a saint unable to lie

here so much as a self-possessed woman governed by pride. But when she reappears near the end, as much a soldier as any man in the French army, she softens instantly at the pitiful sight of her father, stripped of his dignity and his senses. Her sorrow directly echoes that of the Fool, who watches bereft as the monarch's wits get blown away in the storm

Still, for all its weaknesses, the staging is never dull. And watching Jackson is a reward in itself. She's by no means a Lear for the ages, and perhaps couldn't be in such a scattershot production. But, whether striding about the court in a tuxedo, wandering the stormy heath in floppy pajamas, or rescued by the French and clad in a chic brown suit they just happened to have in her size, Jackson's tiny, bird-like physique seems to contain supernatural reserves of stamina. Her technique remains impeccable at 82, and the harsh serrated edges of that diamantine voice could draw blood.
